### Selected Program Highlights from Our Year

Over the past year, the number of child care centers in the county receiving the NC Breastfeeding-Friendly Child Care designation increased from zero to 6. Cabarrus County now has 6 of the 48 designated centers. There are almost 4,000 centers in the state.



Our Circle of Parents support group at Cabarrus County jail provided positive guidance for 28 incarcerated women so they will be better moms upon their release.

95% of children in 8 participating pediatric practices received developmental screenings to ensure early identification and referral to appropriate resources.






