Comprehensive family education program/free materials. A favorite is the Development Stages Wheel, ages birth to 6. Downloading works but is not great; you can order them. First 25 (in English & Spanish) are free each fiscal year. Then, it's 50 cents per wheel. If you complete their questionnaire, shipping is free. They are worth it. Some providers prefer these because they "stand out from the crowd." Other materials include brochures on Special Needs information for parents, Separation - easing the transition from home to child care, Positive Discipline, Communication - positive communication with your child, Exercise, Managing Anger - your child's and your own, Toilet Teaching without Tears, Sleep - helping your children get the rest they need, When A Child Bites, Family Time - keeping family a priority.
