

Keynote Speaker – 8:30 AM TO 9:15 AM*



Ashlie Shanley has prosecuted child crimes in our community for the past twenty-three years. In this presentation, she will describe the cases she most often encounters, share tips on protecting children and discuss the new human trafficking threat.

Biography

Ashlie Shanley is the Chief Assistant District Attorney of Cabarrus County and heads the Safe Haven Special Victims Unit, a unit dedicated to prosecuting the homicide and sexual assault of women and children. In addition, Shanley facilitates the Cabarrus County Human Trafficking Task Force, is a member of the Domestic Violence Initiative, is Vice Chair of the Cabarrus County Child Protection Team and has served as President of the Board of Directors of the Children's Advocacy Centers of North Carolina.

Shanley graduated Cum Laude from Campbell Law School in 1996 and graduated from North Carolina State University with a degree in Business Management. Shanley has travelled throughout North Carolina to conduct trainings for law enforcement officers, the Department of Social Services, forensic nurses, school administration, students, pediatricians and other professionals regarding North Carolina law prosecuting human trafficking cases.

Focus Group: Preschool (Beginning, Intermediate, Experienced)

This workshop will present a full toolbox of curriculum resources to engage Pre-K children in meaningful environmental education activities, along with the benefits and challenges of getting kids outside. Each participant will walk away with new ideas on just how to create positive experiences and meaningful memories for their young naturalists that will help facilitate a lifelong love of the great outdoors!

104 - Take a Hop, Skip and a Jump: Motor Development for Toddlers & Preschoolers that will unlock the IMAGINATION.

Participants will learn about fun, easy and inexpensive gross motor equipment and imaginative activities that are simple to incorporate into any classroom. Motor activities build brain cells and help children burn energy so that they are more focused and ready to learn.

105 - Building Connections with Our Community

Focus Group: Toddler/Preschoolers/School Age, Beginning, Intermediate, Administrator This workshop will take attendees on a journey through their community and show them how every week can be "Community Helper Week", not just a one-time event. Come learn how to engage community partners to provide quality educational opportunities and experiences for your students.

Breakout Sessions 1 (continued)

106 - Positive Classroom, Positive Behavior Leigh Broome, Social Behavior Specialist - Stanly County Partnership for Children Focus Group: Toddler/Preschoolers, Beginning, Intermediate

Everyone is affected by their surroundings – including young children. This workshop will explore the use of space, materials, furnishings, schedule and communication and their influence on children's behaviors. Participants will learn how to use the Pyramid Model and its usage in the early childhood classroom.

107- Finding Balance: Incorporating Yoga in the Classroom Jessica Hendley, EC Preschool Teacher Cabarrus County Schools Focus Group: Toddler/Preschoolers, Beginning, Intermediate

Interested in incorporating yoga into your preschool classroom, but not sure where to start? This session will guide participants into supporting children in body and brain connections as well as breathing activities to support mindfulness. Examples of visual strategies and music will be shared! No yoga experience required!

108 – Warm Woolen Mittens: Building early literacy skills through nature and the five senses Danica Heflin, M.Ed. Reading Education
Focus Group: All – Beginning/Intermediate

Many children struggle to hear and play with the smaller sounds in words that are the building blocks of early literacy, while adults are struggling with too many small sounds—the pings, dings, and other electronic responsibilities that fragment our communication with others. This workshop will share research-based strategies that help adults connect with very young children through a range of literacy activities. We will see how the natural world can engage the five senses, prime us for learning and help adults and children connect to each other and their surroundings. There's no app for this one!

109 – Expanding Language through Literacy and Play Susan Jendrasik, M.S., CCC/SLP & Tammy Rector, M.S, CCC/SLP Focus Group: All

In this hands-on session, participants will be introduced to speech and language development for children 6 months to five years of age. We will discuss the use of literacy to actively engage children in the experience by acting out the story and targeting specific vocabulary, based on language development. There will be an interactive time for (2) different stories; one for 2-3 year olds and one for 4-5 year olds. Strategies will be given to expand children's language skills while engaging in play experiences in both structured and unstructured play activities.

Breakout Sessions 2 - 11:00 am - 12:15 pm

201 - Bring Picture Books and Stories To Life

Maria F. Bostian, Kannapolis Fire Department (Fire & Life Safety Educator) Author Focus Group: Toddlers/Preschoolers/School-Age, Beginning, Intermediate

In this interactive workshop, we will look at picture books and other stories and talk about how to make them 'experiences' that the children will ask for again and again. Participants will learn about inflection, volume, musical instruments, puppets, characters, and more. They will leave with great "take aways" to enhance literacy in the classroom. Bring your favorite books/stories and tips to share with the group.

202 – Playful Inquiry

Kathy Osborne, Kidzone Coordinator (NC Zoo) & Linda Kinney, Manager Play and School Programs

Focus Group: Toddler/Preschool, Beginning, Intermediate

Playful Inquiry explores the value of play and how play is associated with learning. Asking questions, playing with ideas, experimentation and exploration are a part of play and often the beginnings of inquiry. Playful approaches to learning allow children to initiate investigations, which can increase their motivation and engagement, and provide opportunities to explore the questions they care about. When playing and learning outdoors, children develop a relationship with their surroundings and one another, growing into creative thinkers and socially competent, emotionally well-rounded beings. Using strategies employed in the playwork profession, participants will explore ways nature play can connect children and families with the outdoors. The session will include a variety of hands-on activities and opportunities for sharing ideas and reflection.

203 – Conscious Connections; Learning Love through Literacy within the Preschool Environment (Shubert Reflections (Shubert is a S.T.A.R/Shubert Sees the Best/Shubert uses his Big Voice.

Focus Group: All

Come learn all about Shubert and how implementing his child guidance techniques can help guide the children towards creating a 'positive and safe classroom environment'.

204 – 14 Amazing Classroom Materials that keep Students Engaged Dina M. Gutohes, Ivybrook Academy Focus Group: Preschoolers, Beginning, Intermediate, Experienced

206 - How to Make the Chaos Stop!

Focus Group: Toddler/Preschoolers, Beginning, Intermediate

Preschool classrooms can be very busy and sometimes chaotic! Participants will learn strategies to support children in learning schedules, routines, and make transitions run smoothly! This session will provide visual examples and ways to embed strategies naturally throughout the day. The North Carolina Preschool Pyramid Model (SEFEL) will be used referenced and a quick overview of the pyramid will be shared during the session. Participants will gain knowledge on how the schedules, routines, and transitions are vital in the pyramid model!

207 – Facilitating Social and Emotional Growth in Children of Today's Families
Dr. Pam McIntyre, Senior Lecturer, Department of Special Education, Child, and Family
Development; University of North Carolina Charlotte
Focus Group: All

Social and emotional intelligence is vital to children's success in the world. Participants will discuss the importance of empathy, and practice creative and appropriate ways to facilitate social and emotional growth in young children. Children and families, as well as teachers of young children, experience stress in their lives. Learning to recognize emotions and appropriate ways to express emotions helps children develop social and emotional intelligence, leading to happier and more productive, fulfilled lives.

208 - Adverse Childhood Experiences ACE: How Trauma is Impacting Your Students Paula Yost, Cabarrus Child Protection & Fatality Team Chair Focus Group: All

This is an introductory workshop on the ACE Score, the scientific implications of having a high score, and how you can use this knowledge to be a better teacher and advocate for your students.

209 – NC Rules vs. Best Practices Melissa Jones, RN - CCHC & Debra Pless, RN-CCHC Focus Group: Infants/Toddlers/Preschoolers

Participants will discuss basic rules for childcare in NC and Rating Scales to gain a better understanding of their importance, implementation and caring for young children.
